

What is TA Set-Aside?

- Community-based projects
- Transportation projects (land & water)
 - -Expands travel choice
 - -Strengthens local economy
 - -Improve quality of life
 - -Protect the environment





Who is eligible to apply?

- Local Governments
- Regional Transportation Authorities
- Transit Agencies
- Natural resource or public land agencies
- Tribal Governments
- A metropolitan planning organization that serves an urbanized area with a population of 200,000 or fewer (MPOs representing areas over 200,000 population are not eligible)
- Nonprofits partnered with any eligible entity on an eligible project.





What is an eligible project?

- Must relate to surface transportation
- Must be for a complete, identifiable and usable facility or activity (no partial projects that cannot usefully function on their own)
- Must meet the criteria for as least one out of 7 categories





1. Design and construction of on-road and off-road trails facilities for non-motorized transportation users





2. Conversion and use of abandoned RR corridors for trails for non-motorized transportation users





3. Construction of scenic turnouts, overlooks and viewing areas





4. Historic preservation and rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities





5. Community improvement activities e.g. streetscaping and corridor landscaping





6. Environmental mitigation to address stormwater management, control, and water pollution prevention or abatement related to highway construction or due to highway runoff





7. Reduce vehicle-caused wildlife mortality or to restore and maintain connectivity among terrestrial or aquatic habitats








What are eligible costs?

- Design
- Right-of-way acquisition
- Construction

Identify Construction Inspection Services

Project costs NOT eligible for Funding

- Administrative costs
- Miscellaneous "contingencies"
- Utility facility relocation costs
- Uniformed traffic directors unless required by design



What is NOT included in TA Set-Aside?

NOT eligible:

- 1. Pedestrian and bicycle safety and education programs
- 2. Acquisition of scenic or historic easements and sites
- 3. Scenic or historic highway programs including tourist and welcome centers
- 4. Establishment of transportation museums



Recreational Trails Program

The Recreational Trails Program is NOT included in TA Set-Aside

Recreational Trails Program applications are accepted and managed by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP)

If any of the following six requirements are **NOT** included, projects will be considered ineligible.



SIX Program Requirements

- 1. Resolutions/Letters of Support
- 2. Maintenance Commitment
- 3. Responsible Charge
- 4. Projects must relate to surface transportation
- 5. Pick one of the 7 eligible activities
- 6. Mandatory One-on-One Grant Application Meetings

If any of the following six requirements are **NOT** included, projects will be considered ineligible.



1. Resolutions/Letters of Support

- Resolutions <u>must be signed and passed within</u>
 ONE year prior to the solicitation date.
- Must refer to the project
- Include letters of support or approved resolution from owner of public right-of-way (e.g. county).
- If the project is located on or along a county road, a resolution or letter of support is needed.
- If project is on a state road, contact the NJDOT Bureau of Safety, Bicycle and Pedestrian Programs at BIKEPED@dot.nj.gov

If any of the following six requirements are **NOT** included, projects will be considered ineligible.



2. Maintenance Commitment

- Applicant must certify continual ownership and maintenance of the project.
- If applicant does not have jurisdiction over the ROW, then signed letter/resolution must be provided from that party (including county roads).
- Letter/resolution must be dated within ONE year prior to the solicitation date and signed.
- Letter must be addressed to the applicant.

If any of the following six requirements are **NOT** included, projects will be considered ineligible.



3. Responsible Charge

- Provide name, title and employer of the person who will be in charge of the project
- Must be a full-time employee
- Cannot be a consultant
- Is responsible for following federal requirements and day-to-day operations

If any of the following six requirements are **NOT** included, projects will be considered ineligible.



4. Project must relate to surface transportation

- Surface transportation includes both by land and water.
- Transport by water encompasses features such as canals, docks, piers, connecting to ferry operations, etc.

If any of the following six requirements are **NOT** included, projects will be considered ineligible.



5. Project must be one of the 7 eligible activities

- 1. Design and construction of on-road and off-road trails facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists and other non-motorized transportation users:
 - What group is facility meant to service -- pedestrians or bicyclists
 - i. What is the length of the proposed facility in miles

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

Authorization of Federal Aid Funds

- Costs incurred prior to agreement execution of funds are NOT eligible for reimbursement
- Funds are provided on a reimbursement basis
- NJDOT serves as the pass-through,
 - Project must comply with applicable federal laws and regulations
 - Project must have adequate project delivery systems and internal financial controls to manage federal funds
 - NJDOT covers 20% match



Design Assistance Program

- Establishes pool of prequalified consultants
- Meets federal requirements
- Use of consultant pool is not mandatory, but encouraged

Benefits

- Shortens time and reduces costs
- Improves quality and performance
- Provides quicker review times
- Improves compliance with federal requirements

Grant Application Tips & Strategies

Include application requirements

- Signed and dated resolutions must be provided by ALL affected parties (town council AND school board AND county if applicable)
- Include your maintenance commitment in your resolution
- Support Letters addressed to the applicant NOT to NJDOT
- Responsible Charge must be a full-time employee. Can not be a consultant, even if they serve as the engineer of record.
- Schedule and attend a mandatory One-on-One Pre-Application Meeting with NJDOT Local Aid and your MPO.
- Show you are serious about safety for walking & bicycling
- Assess your organization's ability to administer a federal-aid project and prepare accordingly.

Grant Application Tips & Strategies


- Be thorough. Ratings are based on application content.
- Don't assume raters know the project. Application must stand on its own.
- Provide clear project limits on map. NJDOT field checks locations.
- Indicate construction readiness status of permits, right-of-way, & utility relocations.
- Requested project funding should be between \$350,000 and \$1.5 million.
- Include all costs of the project, including construction inspection, and indicate any additional funding sources.

Photos should add scale & context

Do not take close up photos

Use photos to tell your story









Grant Application Tips & Strategies

Don'ts

- Don't submit a completed project
- Don't propose a project on a county road without consulting the county
- Don't propose something that goes against design standards. Project MUST comply with ADA
- Don't propose a sidewalk without accompanying safe street crossings
- Don't propose a project where residents have protested against it





The New Jersey Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation Master Plan has a vision for New Jersey as a place where people choose to walk or bicycle with confidence and a sense of security. To make this happen, New Jersey needs infrastructure improvements that address the safety, mobility, and access needs to non-motorized transportation modes.

NJDOT's Local Bicycle/Pedestrian Planning Assistance Program (LBPPAP) connects consultants with expertise in local bicycle and pedestrian planning to counties and municipalities at no cost. Counties and municipalities simply need to submit an application explaining the desire to grow non-motorized transportation networks. Municipalities or counties that are interested should work on an application (see below) and submit to william:riviere@dot.nl.gov.






